1. Africa Industrialization Day 2020


frica Industrialization Day is celebrated on November 20th each year. The day provides a platform to enhance International cooperation and dialogue on the Pan African and Industrialization agenda to raise awareness of the opportunities and


challenges associated with this drive. This year's theme was centred on promoting inclusive and sustainable industrialization in the African Continental Free Trade Area era (AFCFTA).

In Kenya, the Cabinet Secretary Ministry of Industrialization Trade and Enterprise Development, Betty Maina and the Principal Secretary Industrialization, Dr. Francis Owino led the weeklong celebrations that culminated with the unveiling of the Kenya Industry and Entrepreneurship Project (KIEP). This is a US\$50 million initiative aimed at increasing innovation and productivity in select private sector firms in Kenya by strengthening the private sector (including startups, SMEs, incubators, accelerators, technology boot camp providers, etc.) through financial grants and technical assistance.

The project will be implemented by the Ministry of Industrialization, Trade and Enterprise Development (MoITED), with support from the World Bank Group over the next six years between 2019-2024.









2. KYEOP Implementation Support Mission


very six months, the implementing agencies of the four components of KYEOP, meet with the development partners and present progress reports, discuss challenges faced and plan ahead for the next activities. This end of year Support Mission was however

done virtually owing to the ongoing global health crisis.

Despite the challenges faced in the past months, the Authority has wrapped up Cycle 4 of the project, with 6,457 and 3,504 youths have benefited from start -up grants and BDS respectively. In keeping with the safer and smarter operations, business development training will be done online. Digitization of content for Cycle 5 training is ongoing.







3. World Day of Remembrance for Road Traffic victims

he World Day of Remembrance for Road Traffic Victims takes place on the third Sunday in November every year as the appropriate acknowledgement of victims of road traffic crashes and their families.

It was started by the British road crash victim charity, Road Peace, in 1993 and was adopted by the United Nations General Assembly in 2005 in recognition of its significance for public health and international development, road safety is a key target under the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), with a 50% reduction in road traffic fatalities called for by 2030. MSEA Road Safety Mainstreaming Committee in conjunction with NTSA commemorated the day by raising awareness on #roadsafety among the stakeholders.



4. Inspection of the Chaka Agro-hub project by PS Amb. Weru

S Weru led a multi-agency team to inspect ongoing works at the proposed Chaka Agro-hub facility. This is one of the National Government projects in conjunction with other stakeholders to revamp existing markets by replacing the dilapidated structures with modern stalls of varying sizes and design. The facility which is being upgraded into a special economic zone, will see the goods that will be processed there fall under the international law.

When complete, the hub will house over 2500 traders and will have open sheds, retail block, matatu terminals, public parking, and an underground water tank. The team also visited the New KCC in Kiganjo, the national trout farm and Kiganjo trout hatchery.




